#### Message from the University Librarian

Ms. Lowe extended a hearty welcome to all, both virtual and physical participants, and said that the University of Guyana Library was extremely pleased to collaborate with sister libraries to commemorate National Library Week 2025. She told the audience that a number of activities were organized for the entire week to not only showcase the services available to patrons, but also to embark on new ventures with the aim of remaining relevant in a changing educational landscape. According to Ms. Lowe, at this juncture, the University of Guyana Library's mission is to enhance and expand its services, with the sole purpose of making an impact on the lives of clientele by bringing the library to them, in keeping with the wider university goals.

In her brief remarks, Ms. Lowe shared on the birth of National Library Week 2025 initiative. She referenced Guyana's successful hosting of the 53rd (LIII) Association of Caribbean Universities, Research and Institutional Libraries (ACURIL) Conference in 2024, which brought libraries, archives and museums into the forefront and provided an avenue to showcase skill sets, expertise and most importantly, relevance and research capabilities through the many presentations.

Ms. Lowe said that after becoming University Librarian in September 2024, she thought of ways in which to continue to keep the work of libraries in the forefront to maintain relevance in this ever-changing landscape. Initially, her plan was to resuscitate the University of Guyana Library Professional Seminars which provided an avenue for librarians to present their research findings, have their research works peer-reviewed and to ultimately seek avenues to publish their research works. However, on second thought, it was decided that commemoration of National Library Week 2025 would be a more appropriate forum as it allowed for inclusion of other libraries and augured well for cooperation among the University of Guyana Library and other libraries in Guyana.

In closing, Ms. Lowe lauded the continued meaningful collaborations between UG Library and National Library and urged all present to participate, connect, reconnect and network as they share their experiences. She also took time out to thank the Planning Team and other stakeholders for whatever role they would have played in contributing to the success of the week of activities.

## Message from the Deputy Chief Librarian, National Library

The Deputy Chief Librarian, Ms. Nadine Moore, brought wishes on behalf of the National Library. In her brief presentation, Ms. Moore examined the evolving role of libraries and highlighted how libraries transformed from the traditional mode, where they served as sanctuaries of silence and study, repositories of knowledge and keepers of books, to now being vibrant social hubs that foster community engagement, collaboration, and cultural exchange.

Ms. Moore said that the National Library recognized that the digital age has changed the way people consumed information and, in response, has pivoted toward fostering creativity, connectivity, and innovation and positioned itself as a "living room for the city"—a place not just for accessing knowledge, but for creating it. The National Library was no longer just the custodian of books and historical records, but has actively reimagined as a people-centered knowledge hub.

To emphasize this point, Ms. Moore, pointed out that while the National Library has maintained traditional reading areas, they have now opened a conference room for events and expanded their programming to reflect this evolving role. Some of the social-centred events identified were:

- Spoken Word Sessions and Cultural Workshops that celebrate and preserve local heritage.
- Health & Wellness Programs such as yoga, mental health talks, and nutrition sessions—particularly supporting seniors and caregivers, building trust and fostering holistic well-being.
- Job Readiness & Entrepreneurship Support, including résumé clinics, digital literacy classes, and small business workshops.

Ms. Moore concluded by reiterating how happy the National Library was in joining the University of Guyana Library in celebrating National Library Week 2025 as, over the years, the two libraries have built a strong partnership, sharing ideas, knowledge and collaborative projects. She ended by encouraging all present to continue to deliver services that promote literacy and advance their libraries ever plus ultra, beyond the ordinary.

#### Celebrating Excellence, Innovation, and the Enduring Spirit of Libraries – Prof. Paloma Mohamed Martin, Vice Chancellor, XI

The University of Guyana Library proudly celebrated National Library Week 2025 with a series of reflections, recognitions and calls to action. A key highlight was the stirring address delivered by Vice-Chancellor, **Professor** Paloma Mohamed, who joined the celebrations with a heartfelt tribute library professionals and to advocates across the nation.

the Vice-Chancellor In remarks, her acknowledged the tremendous contributions of individuals within the university library system, recognizing newly appointed Librarian, Ms. Debra Lowe and Deputy Librarian, Dr. Simone Bernard, as well as saluting the lasting legacies of former Librarian, Mrs. Gwyneth George, and Ms. Donette Washington. She extended warm appreciation to the broader team for their ongoing commitment, and to the partners from the National Library for their unwavering support.

Referencing the year's theme, "Rethinking the Future: Libraries as a Social Space," Professor Mohamed emphasized the importance of embracing innovation while safeguarding identity and cultural heritage. Drawing on her own experience and insights from the ACURIL conference, she noted the urgent need to digitize rare materials, stories, and cultural artefacts, many of which remain invisible in the digital realm. "Technology may bring convenience," she said, "but it also highlights the gaps in representation. The documents that tell our story must be preserved and shared widely, lest they slip into obscurity."

She called on library professionals to spearhead efforts in digitization, not just to modernize collections, but to preserve knowledge for future generations. At the same time, she encouraged critical thinking about the changing role of librarians, particularly as digital access increases and physical spaces evolve.

In her closing, the Vice-Chancellor urged libraries to act with urgency. She said that "The future is forged in the actions we take today. Let us future-proof not only our libraries but also our library staff. Let us equip them with the tools, training, and support needed to thrive in a rapidly shifting landscape." Her address ended with a powerful reminder that libraries, though vulnerable to modern threats, remain powerful symbols of truth, culture, and resilience.

The University of Guyana Library joins the VC in celebrating all library champions past and present and remains committed to innovation, access, and the enduring mission of librarianship.

Six engaging presentations were delivered by a diverse group of librarians during the symposium. Each presentation offered valuable insights into different aspects of library services, innovation, and professional development. The speakers shared practical experiences, emerging trends, and forward-thinking ideas that sparked meaningful discussions among attendees.

A dedicated educator and social scientist, she specializes in Gender and Development and has led extensive research and training on issues such as domestic violence, human trafficking, and social inequality. Ms. Benn is also a published author and community advocate, committed to empowering women and vulnerable groups across Guyana.

Two impactful workshops were conducted during the library symposium, each offering a unique perspective on the evolving role of libraries and the well-being of library professionals.

The first workshop, "Your Mental Health is Wealth," conducted by Ms. Benn, focused on the importance of mental well-being in the workplace. It emphasized self-care strategies, stress management techniques, and the value of creating supportive work environments. Participants were encouraged to prioritize their mental health and left the session with practical tools to promote balance and resilience in their professional and personal lives.

A powerful male empowerment session was conducted by Ms. Eraina Yaw, Head of Office at the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Guyana and the Regional Coordination Office for the Caribbean. Held at the University of Guyana Library, the session was specially organized for male library staff and addressed critical issues such as domestic violence, abuse, and emotional well-being. Ms. Yaw led an open and engaging discussion that encouraged participants to reflect on healthy masculinity, the importance of emotional intelligence, and the courage it takes to walk away from toxic environments. The session created a safe space for honest dialogue, self-awareness, and empowerment, emphasizing that strength also lies in choosing peace, respect, and support for oneself and others.

A timely and thought-provoking session titled "Preserving Mental Health While Providing Library Services" was conducted by Mrs. Audrey Benn, Head of the Department of Sociology, along with Ms. Latoya Beckles and Ms. Ornetta Waldron, Lecturers in the Department of Sociology, Faculty of Social Sciences, University of Guyana. This session was attended by staff members of the University of Guyana Library and focused on the unique mental health challenges faced by library professionals in their day-to-day roles. The presenters highlighted the emotional demands of public service, the importance of setting healthy boundaries, and practical strategies for managing stress and burnout. Through an engaging and supportive dialogue, staff were encouraged to prioritize their well-being while continuing to provide quality service. The session fostered a deeper understanding of the need for self-care in the workplace and reaffirmed the value of empathy, mindfulness, and institutional support in maintaining a healthy work environment.
